A group of young musicians from Macleod College have continued their tradition of excellence at the recent Generations in Jazz competition in Mt Gambier, SA.

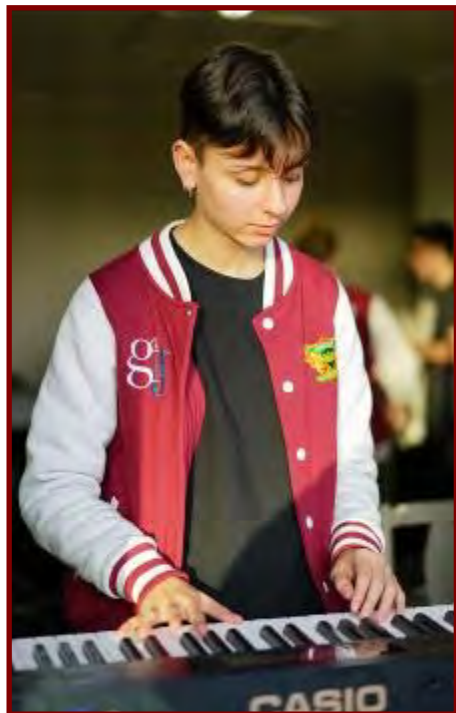
Chief amongst these is year 12 Trombonist, Ethan Billman who was selected as lead Trombone from 60 bands for the Division 3 Super Band.

Owen Year 7

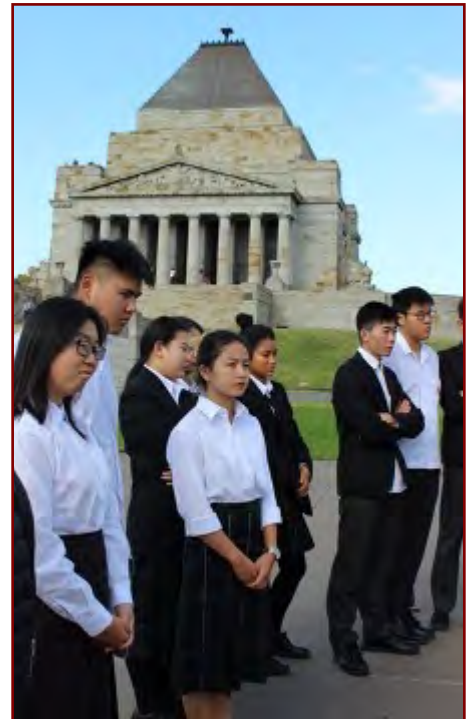
World War II items such as cups, helmet and money. I learnt about history.

In the Community Garden

Sandra has continued pruning the fruit trees and already the apricots are in blossom. There has also been deadheading of flowers on the herbs and transplanting of mallow, lovage, alpine strawberry, French sorrel, wallflowers, oregano, red-veined chicory and masses of garlic chives which will act as a companion plant beneath the fruit tree, deterring a range of bugs. A start has been made on removing citrus gall.

Tip of the Week: Brassicas



Plant these deeply, covering the lowest pair of leaves. Brassicas planted with the root stem above the ground are unstable and blow about in the wind and do not produce decent heads. Avoid

high nitrogen fertilizers as these cause leaves to grow at the expense of heads.

Safety around schools

A Banyule road safety initiative

Keeping our children safe

Speed zones, pedestrian crossings and parking restrictions around schools are there to improve the movement of traffic during peak times and maximise safety for children and all road users.



How can Council help?

Council's Local Laws Officers regularly patrol streets and roads around Banyule schools at peak school times.

Remember

It is an offence to:

- Double park by stopping next to a legally parked vehicle, even for a short time or to drop off/pick up passengers.
- Stop or park across a driveway, footpath or dividing strip except when picking up or dropping off passengers.
- Stop or park within 10 metres of an intersection or corner that doesn't have traffic lights.
- Stop or park across or in a bus zone.

Road rules, parking and traffic signs are there to protect the safety of all pedestrians and road users.

Council's Local Laws Officers can and will issue fines.

Help us ensure the safety of children, pedestrians and motorists around our streets and schools.

You can help by obeying road rules and allowing enough time to drop off and pick up of your child.

Children are vulnerable and subject to acting on impulse. It is vital that adults lead by example and set good road safety practices when crossing roads.

5 tips around schools

1. Allow enough time to take your child to the school gate safely. Consider parking a few streets away and walking your child the rest of the way to school.
2. Obey all traffic control signs and the directions of the school crossing supervisor.
3. Plan with your child as to when and where they can be picked up or dropped off safely. Find locations where it is safe to get out of the car and cross the road.
4. Where available, always cross at a supervised school crossing even if it is further away.
5. Never call your child from across the road.



Observe parking signs



No stopping

No stopping zones cannot be used at any time for stopping, parking, dropping off or picking up students/passengers. These zones can also be marked by yellow lines.



No parking

You can only park your car in this zone for up to 2 minutes to deliver/pick up goods and/or passengers. The driver must remain near the vehicle at all times.



Disabled parking

This parking space can only be used by vehicles displaying a blue disabled parking permit. Vehicles without a permit cannot park here at all, even to drop off/pick up.



Bus zones

Bus zones are for public or private bus use only. The driver of a private vehicle is not allowed to stop in a bus zone at any time.

Other common parking rules

Pedestrian crossings

A vehicle must not stop 20 metres before or 10 metres after a school crossing, which is generally defined by yellow line markings. This ensures children can be clearly seen by approaching vehicles.



Double parking

Vehicles must not stop on a road adjacent to another vehicle even for a short time or to drop off/pick up passengers. Double parking forces other vehicles to divert, causing traffic congestion and line of sight issues, which can cause accidents with pedestrians or vehicles.



Driveways and yellow lines

A vehicle is allowed to stop over the entrance to a driveway to pick up/drop off passengers, but drivers must not wait or leave their vehicles across a driveway entrance for more than 2 minutes. Areas marked with a yellow line are no stopping areas.



To assist schools with getting the Road Safety Message out to parents, Banyule City Council would like to provide you with the below information you can put in your school publications to better educate road users.

The information provided relates specifically to signage and Road Rules associated mostly around schools

NO STOPPING SIGNS

Vehicles are not permitted to stop in an area that a No Stopping Sign applies.

Even if the vehicle is on, not in park and with the brake pedal engaged, it is still committing an offence.

You will find these mostly on intersections, at School Crossings or in locations where it has been found that vehicles stopping has the potential to cause accidents or injury to other road users, including pedestrians.

Some No Stopping signs will have restricted operating times, so it's best to double check these, outside of peak pickup and drop off times.

Rule 167 (Road Safety Road Rules 2017)

NO PARKING SIGNS

Vehicles are permitted to stop in an area that a No Parking Sign applies under the following conditions:

- To drop off/pick up goods or passengers,
- That the vehicle does not stop for longer than 2 minutes*,
- The DRIVER of the vehicle remains within 3 metres of the vehicle while the goods/passengers are being dropped off/picked up.

*Some No Parking signs may have a time specified on the sign, such as 5 Minutes, etc. This means that you can stop here for the indicated time, but the driver must remain within 3 metres of the vehicle.

Some No Parking signs will have restricted operating times, so it's best to double check these, outside of peak pickup and drop off times.

These Signs are usually installed for quick pick up and drop off of children around schools.

Rule 168 (1) (Road Safety Road Rules 2017)



TIME RESTRICTED PARKING (SHORT TERM)

These restricted parking areas are primarily designed to allow Parents to pull up, let their children get out of the vehicle and escort them to the school gate, giving them sufficient time to return to their vehicle and pull away.

The most common time restrictions are for 2, 5, 10 and 15 Minutes.

It's important that drivers carefully read the sign and understand the time restriction.

Generally, parking restrictions of 2 and 5 Minutes are designed to allow children to get out of the vehicle and be escorted to the school gate only.

These restrictions play an important role in keeping the flow of traffic moving.

Should a driver or parent require more time or wish to engage in social conversation, it is recommended they find longer term parking.

Rule 205 (Road Safety Road Rules 2017)



STOPPING ON A NATURE STRIP

No vehicle is permitted to stop on a nature strip.

This is important for a number of reasons:

- Essential services can run under these nature strips and continual driving can cause damage to these services.
- Vehicles parked on nature strips can obstruct the view for motorists of other vehicles and pedestrians.
- Parking on nature strips can cause damage and uneven surfaces for pedestrian traffic that could ultimately cause an injury.

It's important to remember that nature strips do not necessarily have to have grass on them. Some nature strips have been worn down, largely due to illegal vehicle traffic, but are still enforceable.

LOADING ZONE SIGNS

Loading zones are designed and designated for a specific purpose. They are for commercial vehicles or vehicles that are undertaking commercial delivery work.

To stop in a Loading Zone the following criteria must be met:

- A Bus or vehicle for hire (Taxi, VHA/B/C plated vehicles)
- A truck, or vehicle that is designed primarily for the transport of goods (sedans, station wagons and motorbikes are not permitted*)
- A vehicle that is displaying a courier vehicle* or delivery vehicle sign*.
- A vehicle that is registered as a goods carrying vehicle.

* A vehicle that meets the requirements of a courier or delivery vehicle must meet the following requirements:

- Signage that states "COURIER", "DELIVERY VEHICLE" or a business name/logo and,
- Is a minimum of 50mm high and,
- Is contrasting to the colour of the vehicle and,
- Is permanently affixed to both sides of the vehicle (no magnetic signs).

Rule 179 (1) (Road Safety Road Rules 2017)

BUS ZONE SIGNS

A vehicle must not stop in a bus zone unless it is a public bus.

Even if drivers are stopping to let passengers out, they are committing an offence.

It's important to keep these zones clear to allow school buses safely enter these zones and drop children off.

Rule 183 (1) (Road Safety Road Rules 2017)



Rule 197 (1) (Road Safety Road Rules 2017)

STOPPING NEXT TO A YELLOW EDGE LINE

Vehicles are not permitted to stop on or next to a yellow edge line.

Yellow edge lines are installed in some cases where vehicles stopping can cause traffic congestion or where it is unsafe for vehicles to park such as across driveways or between two driveways where there is insufficient space for an average sized vehicle to park.

Rule 169 (Road Safety Road Rules 2017)

STOPPED – DOUBLE PARKED

No vehicle is permitted to stop and double park.

This can cause a dangerous situation for other motorists and passengers getting out of the illegally parked vehicles.

Even if the vehicle's ignition is on and not in park, an offence is being committed.

Rule 189 (Road Safety Road Rules 2017)

STOPPED ON A FOOTPATH

Vehicles must not stop on a footpath.

This can force pedestrians onto the road or unknown terrain, which can possibly lead to a fall or being struck by traffic.

Even if vehicles park on a footpath and driveway, with the crossover still available for pedestrians to get around, drivers are committing an offence.

Rule 197 (1) (Road Safety Road Rules 2017)


STOPPED ON/ACROSS A DRIVEWAY

Vehicles must not stop on or across a driveway, unless they are dropping off passengers or goods, not stay longer than 2 minutes and the driver remains within 3 metres of the vehicle.

However, it is best to keep driveways clear to ensure residents can leave their property with ease and without conflict.

Rule 198 (2) (Road Safety Road Rules 2017)
